Second Reading: Romans 4:1-5, 13-17

What then are we to say was gained by Abraham, our ancestor according to the flesh? For if Abraham was justified by works, he has something to boast about, but not before God. For what does the scripture say? “Abraham believed God, and it was reckoned to him as

righteousness.” Now to one who works, wages are not reckoned as a gift but as something due. But to one who without works trusts him who justifies the ungodly, such faith is reckoned as righteousness. For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation. For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, “I have made you the father of many nations”) —in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist.

No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man. And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.

SCRIP Program - It's Really Just Gift Cards For Sale

St. Dunstan's runs a Scrip program to benefit our Outreach ministries. Basically, we sell gift cards to many brands for their face value, and the church gets the benefit of a discount. For some brands - such as Albertsons or Amazon - the discount is only 1.5 or 2.0%. For others - especially clothing vendors like Lands' End or Nike - the discount may be more than 10%. So if you buy a Nike gift card for \$50, you get to purchase \$50 of Nike merchandise and the Outreach program gets \$5.50 representing the 11% discount for this brand.

Gift cards are sold after both services on Sundays. Some vendors' gift cards are in stock and can be acquired on the spot. Examples include Denny's, Amazon, Starbucks, Target, and Walmart in various denominations. Other vendors' cards are special ordered, usually for delivery the following Sunday. There are hundreds of vendors in this category, ranging from Carnival Cruise Lines and Southwest Airlines to Shake Shack, to name only a few; the complete list of participating brands is available at the Scrip table after services. Special orders resume Sunday, February 8. All purchases are paid for by check or cash at the time of purchase or special order.

INFORMATION FOR THE SERVICE

St. Dunstan's Pledge cards are available in the back of the church. You can mail a check to the office or donate online through ACS or on www.stdunstans.org or in person on Sunday morning.

If you wear **hearing aids with T-coil** you can hear our service directly through your hearing aids. If you do not have T-coil, or have hearing loss and are not yet ready for hearing aids, you can use one of our portable receivers and headset. A "**quiet room**" with streaming of the service is available in the back corner of this building and accessible seating options are marked and available throughout the church. Check with a Hospitality Minister for assistance.

Children of all ages are welcome in our services (noises and all). Our nursery is also open all morning for ages 0-3 (located on the east side of this building) and our "Pray-Ground" (front-left pew of the church) is open during the service with quiet children's activities. Christian education is at 9:00am for all ages (Sept-May) and during the 10:00am service children are welcome to come forward for a "Children's Moment" and may leave with teachers during the sermon for brief children's education and return just before Holy Communion. Children of all ages may receive Holy Communion at their parent's discretion.

Accessible bathrooms are located inside the church to the left and right of the main entrance. Please let a Hospitality Minister know if you need assistance with anything or have any questions.
